ASH WEDNESDAY - MARCH 9

1:00 P.M. IN THE CHAPEL ROOM; 7:30 P.M. IN THE SANCTUARY

Ash Wednesday is the traditional beginning of the season of Lent. This day initiates the 40-day period of spiritual preparation and personal repentance that leads up to the celebration of the resurrection of Christ on Easter Day. At our services, we will mark the beginning of this somber season with the celebration of Holy Communion and the Invitation to observe a Holy Lent through the imposition of ashes.

We will move through the painful and tragic story of Jesus' journey to the cross and remember Jesus' last supper with his disciples by sharing Holy Communion together. The sanctuary will slowly be darkened and the mood will turn to deep grief as we hear of Jesus' broken body placed in the tomb.


STAFFING CHANGES


Rev. Anderman



"SMALL THINGS with GREAT LOVE"

Beth and Tim Folkomer were asked by the Adult Education Team to lead a class revisiting the book, which was presented last fall, during the spring season.

"Dear friends at Covenant UMC,

I am writing to thank you for the gift we recently received via the Advance for our "Nutrition for Urban Communities" project. At present, our work is focused on two slum communities but after four years we are looking to downgrade our activities in one slum and look for a new community to start working with next year.

"The goal of this project is to help families provide better nutrition to their women and children through training and awareness-raising. Apart from the salary of our nutrition in-charge Rita Shakya, who manages and runs all the activities, your money is used directly for the training of mothers, pregnant and newlydelivered ladies, for the monthly weighing of under-5 children to monitor their growth, and for the visiting and support of families of malnourished children, including the provision of small amounts of charity in the form of a nutritious flour for porridge.

"We would appreciate your prayers for this work – many of the families are transient and live life 'on the edge' with little time, energy or money for making changes that could benefit their children's long-term future. We also appreciate your prayers as we begin the process of selecting our new working area – probably in a poor part of the city with a lot of migrant workers living in tenements.


On Friday, October 4th a special Blessing of the Animals Service took place in the courtyard between Epworth and Kingswood Buildings.








TROOP 512

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

United Methodist Women began in 1869 as the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society to send a doctor and an educator to India to aid the women and children affected negatively by cultural and societal practices of the day. Now, more than 146 years later, this group has evolved into the United Methodist Women with primary focus to improve the lives of disadvantage women, youth and children, both locally and globally, by supporting programs which work with this segment of the population who are affected by such issues as immigration and refugee status, illiteracy and poverty, among many others. Circles are small groups within the local church that meet to carry out the mission of UMW.

The **Elizabeth Circle**, formed in 1987, consisted of 23 women from Covenant who met every month. They have been involved in helping domestic abuse victims, making and sending birthing kits for third world countries, adopting an underprivileged school in Philadelphia supplying them with needed paper and school supplies and holding a book drive where members of the congregation donated books for the children in this school. For the past two years, the Elizabeth Circle cooked, served and cleaned up for many Keenager Dinners.

The **Joanna and Esther Circles** joined together last year and met once each month. They shared a time of fellowship and opened each meeting with a devotion. All are members of the prayer chain. They have contributed to the Heifer project and made 20 gift bags for the folks at Harlee Manor. In December they took boxes of small useful items to former members of the circle who could no longer come to meetings.

Saturday Sisters was a new circle meeting on one Saturday each month for fellowship and sustenance and to grow their faith.

NEW STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

After thoughtful consideration, the Vision Team selected the words "Changing Lives with Jesus" to encapsulate what we believe God is calling our church to be and do.

SOUPER BOWL OF CARING

The Souper Bowl of Caring Team thanked the members and friends of Covenant who donated 1835 cans of soup and \$1,981 to the Loaves & Fishes Food Pantry. The community wide weekend food drive resulted in donations of cash and food totaling 35,316 units which was the best that had been done, 26% more than the previous year.



ADULT EDUCATION COURSE




The Building Committee has brought the project to the point where we are ready to schedule a Future Focus Workshop where you will have the opportunity to discuss and help answer five questions:





COVENANT UPDATE

Every Thursday, Covenant's **Digital Ministry Team** sends the *Covenant Update* to highlight some Sunday bulletin and *Caller* articles and to remind members of current and planned activities. With the *Covenant Caller* being mailed once a month, a brief emailed weekly newsletter is a good way to stay in touch.

For some time now, we have been engaging in a process of discernment about a building project at Covenant. You may be wondering what the process is, when we will know the final plans, and how soon the project will begin. The process has been and will continue to be deliberate. It began with prayerful discernment of God's will for the future of Covenant Church. It was during this time of discernment that we made some changes to our Statement of Purpose (see below) and began using the tag line "Changing Lives with Jesus."

Next, we began to look at how our buildings impact ministry. The Board of Trustees saw a need for changes and updates. After working with architect Jack Althouse, they recommended the creation of a Building Committee (BC) which picked up where the Trustees left off. The BC eventually prioritized a plan to make the Kingswood Building both more accessible and usable with the addition of a new ground level entrance, the building of an elevator, air conditioning, and other updates to Fellowship Hall. In the Epworth Building, plans were drawn to enhance child safety by adding new sinks and restrooms accessible to each classroom.

Our next steps are to see how much money will be pledged, then work with the architect and construction manager to determine just how much of the dream we can build. With congregational input, the Building Committee will make recommendations which will be reviewed by the District Committee on Church Location and Building. That group will take a dispassionate look at the plans and approve them as is or make suggestions for changes to help perfect the plan.

The final decisions on building changes will be made by you, the members of Covenant Church. The plans will be published and distributed and then a Church Conference will be called where we can discuss all issues before we make final decisions. Once final decisions are made, the architects, construction managers, and engineers will prepare buildable plans to replace the conceptual drawings we have been using.

It sounds like a long and arduous process, and in fact, it is long and arduous! However, it is designed to be sure we do not make hasty decisions that are not in the church's ultimate best interest.



Please continue to pray our prayer, "Lord, what do you want to do through me? Pray also for the church, "Lord, what do you want to do through Covenant?" With God's faithful guidance and our attentive listening to God's will we are indeed making a "Covenant for the Future."



Building Committee Update

May 15, 2018

Dear Members of Covenant,

The Building Committee is working hard to continue developing the Capital Campaign Project and is pleased to provide you with the following update.

As you may recall, the last presentation of the Building Committee took place on February 4, 2018 at the Church Conference where we presented the latest scope, drawings, and budget. The project consists of major updates and improvements focused on accessibility: including a new elevator, lobby, and ADA entrances, as well as updating Fellowship Hall with air conditioning, new bathrooms, new ceiling and floors, and improved acoustics. We also proposed substantial plumbing improvements in the Epworth Building, including adding sinks to all classrooms and four new child-friendly bathrooms.

The Church Conference resulted in a vote that approved the complete project, but tabled the entire proposal until AT&T begins to pay rent and the project is reapproved by the congregation in a subsequent Church Conference. AT&T's rent payment is a contributing factor to the project. AT&T has been providing updates and we are pleased to be informed they have secured the



required Springfield Township permits and zoning variance. They are now working on completing the required work for the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). AT&T advised us they are highly regulated by federal and state as well as local government. Once they have all aspects of the permit secured, we will finalize the schedule for payment (rent) and work to be completed. AT&T's lead representative has continued to keep the Trustees and Building Committee informed regularly.

As stipulated in the vote at February's Church Conference, once AT&T has started to pay rent, a follow-up Church Conference will be scheduled with the District Superintendent, Dawn Taylor-Storm and the members of Covenant United Methodist Church. We will plan to have revised project numbers stemming from professionally evaluated construction and consultant bids, as well as an update on all financial contributing factors.

In the months since the Church Conference, the Building Committee has continued their efforts to examine the project's consultants, schedule, and costs. It was unanimously decided to hire an "owner's rep" to help navigate the project and provide guidance through their professional experience. The company we have hired is called Owner's Rep, Inc. and they have immediately started to evaluate all aspects of the project to save costs, including consultants (architects, engineer, general contractors), as well as materials, schedule, etc. Even the consultants the Building Committee has been working with will be re-evaluated and requested to submit a new bid, along with others. Due to the size of our project, utilizing Owner's Rep, Inc. will provide Covenant with the professional guidance and decision making we need to successfully meet our budget and schedule.

The Building Committee is overwhelmed with joy to be notified by the Board of Trustees that the Capital Campaign Project is receiving \$40,000 from the John J. Barranger Charitable Trust. Jack Barranger served as Covenant's long-time treasurer before he passed away several years ago. Covenant was named as the residual beneficiary of the trust which will benefit several other areas at Covenant Church including maintenance items the Trustees are working to complete. We are beyond words to receive such a generous bequest, one that was unexpected, yet will significantly help us reach our goal of completing the entire Capital Campaign Project.




AT&T RENTS SPACE

The 2019 "Gifts from the Heart" project was a wonderful success. Thanks to the generosity of Covenant, a total of \$1,920 was distributed to: Appalachia Service Project, Life Center of Eastern Delaware County, Nutrition Promotion Consultancy Service in Nepal, Loaves & Fishes Food Pantry in Prospect Park, and the South District Mission Project: Abundant Life Locally and Globally."



In January, Covenant youth attended a Youth Rally 2020 in Ocean City, Maryland. Youth Rally was a gathering of 3,500-4,000 youth and youth workers from Friday night to Sunday afternoon. The year's theme was "Inseparable" and the theme's verse was Romans 8:38-39. In this verse, Paul wrote: "For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to

separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord." There were bands like Zealand Worship Band (The worship band for the week end), Citizens Way, and Seth and Nirva. Mixed into the music were powerful speakers which resonated with the youth.

UNITED OR UNTIED: WHAT IS THE FUTURE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH?

Based on the vote at last year's special General Conference of the United Methodist Church which focused on human sexuality and LBGTQ issues, there was an increased discussion about the future of the United Methodist Church. Over last year's holiday season, the children and staff of CNS/CMO collected 154 pajamas for the Scholastic Pajama Program. This program gives a pair of pajamas and a new book to help children enjoy the benefit of a loving bedtime and peaceful goodnight.



COVENANT UNVEILS ITS NEW VISUAL IDENTITY

The dove with an olive branch symbolizes hope. In the Old Testament, the dove's appearance is followed by God's Covenant with his people, a Covenant and hope that are exemplified in the New Testament by God sending his only Son – a Son who can change lives. It is this symbolism, as well as the connection to the dove in Covenant's rose window, that led the Communication Renovation Team and the Planning and Policy Team (PPT) to accept and introduce this logo as an integral part of Covenant's new visual identity.



Christ's hands and feet were definitely moving things in this year's Delco Souper Bowl of Caring food drive. This local food drive is part of the National Souper Bowl of Caring (SBOC), a youth-inspired, youth-led movement,

celebrating 30 years of service. Covenant was an integral part of this effort to reduce food insecurity in Delaware County. We contributed in two ways: through the community food drive and our Sunday food drive, all working toward the same cause – to tackle hunger.

The community food drive is an amazing undertaking, coordinated by Joe Couchara of Life Christian Fellowship church, in which local churches, schools, youth groups, scout troops, and individuals work together on both Saturdays before the Super Bowl. On Saturday, January 25th, hundreds of volunteers, distributed informational flyers to thousands of homes in neighborhoods of Springfield, Drexel Hill,



Westbrook Park, Rutledge, Morton, Ridley, Media, and Aston. After that, lawn signs, coordinated by "sign man" Don Cadge, started popping up all across these neighborhoods declaring the food drive is on! Then, on Saturday, February 1st, volunteers returned to these neighborhoods to collect donations that residents were generous enough to leave out for pick-up. These donations were taken to six churches who participate as pack-out centers, where even more volunteers counted and boxed up items for delivery to six local food banks.

Each year, this effort grows. The people involved in SBOC know that the need is still there – and growing. More local families are unable to provide food for themselves and have to turn to local food banks. As of 2016, the food insecurity rate in Delaware County was 13 percent. That's 73,890 people. This number has surely grown. Joanne Castagna, Director of the Loaves and Fishes Food Pantry in Prospect Park, said they anticipate serving well over the 1,100 client families they served last year. Aware of the need, the 2020 collection expanded into areas of Aston and Media.

The 2020 collection was very successful in part due to the help from Covenant. The Saturday food drive was a beautiful example of cooperation between many local churches, schools, and groups. The St. Francis of Assisi Parish normally serves as a pack-out center on the Saturday collection. This year, they were unable to use their facilities due to construction. So Covenant offered some of our newly renovated facilities. We worked with Jim Larkin from St. Francis to make sure everything was in place for the Saturday pack-out operation. The combination of Covenant's easily accessible space and St. Francis' people power proved to be a winning combination as more donations than ever were counted, boxed, and delivered, and in less time. The additional door into the Kingswood building (with no steps) made the whole operation easier.

Then, on Sunday, February 2nd, Covenant came together to contribute more. Through your generosity, you brought in donations of food and money to the church. The Sunday school children did a terrific job collecting coins in soup cups which they brought up for the children's moment during service. They made a lot of joyful noise dumping all those coins into a big soup pot for a total of \$123.30. After worship, our youth helped count and box all of the donations received. Last weekend, we delivered \$1,816 and 1,456 food items (1,677 lbs.) to the Loaves & Fishes Food Pantry. Joanne told us the food delivered should help feed local families for the next month.

Through all of these cooperative efforts, people came together to do just what the organizers had hoped – they provided more food than ever to local food pantries – a record 41,051 units (food and dollars). People came together to do just what Jesus calls us to do – serve and feed others. In Matthew, chapter 25, Jesus says "for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink ... just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." Many people, including some of you, were the hands and feet of Christ during the 2020 Delco Souper Bowl of Caring. You used your hands and feet to move mountains of food and hope. Thank you!

- The Church Office closed, though voicemails were being monitored,
- Worship was held on-line not in-person: No choir, no funerals, no weddings, no baptisms, no in-person Bible studies,
- Later postings of Sunday services were found on YouTube,
- Pastor Mark shared a message each morning on the church Facebook page and other updates were found there as well,
- Pastor Mark set up a "room" at GoToMeeting so any meetings which were needed could be done via video conference,
- Pastor Mark met with any kids at 10 a.m. Monday through Friday via a Zoom call,
- The yearly Appalachian Service Project was suspended until August 2020,
- The popular Covenant Dinner/Auction canceled.
- Vacation Bible School canceled.
- Covenant Nursery School closed

WHAT DID WE DO.....

Three teams were formed to address the church's response to the new reality we were living in.


- 1. **Health and Safety Task Force** to work on policies and procedures for the safe use of the buildings as it gradually reopens.
- 2. Loan Surplus Task Force to decide the wisest and most generous use of the surplus funds from the government loan that did not need to be paid back. Covenant applied for and received \$92,300 from the Paycheck Protection Program, the loan program created by the Federal Government which helps small business and churches keep their employees paid during this unprecedented time. This money helped pay our Nursery School staff through the end of their school year and helped pay church staff and our utilities through the middle of July.
- 3. **Worship Task Force** to work on the worship service which will evolve both in person and online as things start to open up.

An **Outdoor Communion Service** was started on July 15th in the church parking lot which was offered at 6 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. People gathered in a safely spaced circle in the upper lot by the playground for prayer and Communion.

ASP Took a Detour: Since the summer mission trip to Appalachia was canceled, the group looked for other local single day mission projects, coronavirus conditions permitting. Good Neighbors



Home Repair is a faith-based organization servicing Chester County, PA and northern New Castle, Delaware. On July 9th, Covenant's first Mini Mission Day was held for a homeowner in New Castle County. A crew of 10 accomplished removing an old roof and started the installation. A few weeks later they returned to finish the new roof.



<u>Music</u>

Singers, instrumentalists, and ringers individually recorded anthems for the streamed services. In November, our ever-resourceful Music and Bell Choir Directors, procured software to enable the choir to make a virtual anthem for Christmas Eve. Each choir member traveled to the church at scheduled times to be videotaped and recorded. Wearing headsets, choir members sang a "Solo" to the

music. Kirk Schneider then had the arduous job of putting it all together with violin and piano accompaniment. The choir sang "Immanuel" by Benjamin Knoedler and text by Garrett Paul Martin. Ben Weaver (Violin) accompanied the choir.

Helping Others

With money available from the John Barranger gift to Covenant and in support of food banks which Covenant regularly supports facing overwhelming need, Covenant sent along blessings to Loaves & Fishes and St. Mark's Food pantries totaling \$3,000.

The traditional "Harvest Home" food collection also continued with a plea for money rather than food collection which resulted in \$2,700 given to Loaves & Fishes to provide a Thanksgiving meal for those in need.

Once again, Covenant offered the opportunity for persons to make a donation in the *Gifts from the Heart* Program. When a donation was made to the selected outreach ministries, a card was mailed to the donee so it could be personalized and sent to inform the recipient a gift had been given in their honor. \$3,155 was distributed to the following ministries: Appalachia Service Project, Life Center of Eastern Delaware County, Loaves & Fishes Food Pantry, Eastern Pennsylvania Conference Camp & Retreat Ministry, and Nutrition Promotion Consultancy Service in Nepal.



With an idea from Dawn Hanrahan and in-person services still in question, for a donation of \$5.00 per dedication a bulb was added to a Christmas tree in the doorway of Wesley Hall on Saxer Avenue in memory, honor, or gratitude. The tree was lit on the first Sunday of Advent and culminated on Christmas Eve. All donations benefitted CASA Youth Advocates of Delaware and Chester Counties.



Covenant's White Tag Tree went virtual. Toys were requested for girls and boys at the Eliza Shirley Shelter in Philadelphia, refugee children who were served by Nationalities Service Center in Philadelphia and the Bridge to Recover group in Delaware County. Gifts were to be shipped directly to the facilities.

AS WE STARTED TO RECOVER......

- In October, a Red Cross Blood Drive was held at Covenant with 23 units of blood donated which benefitted 65 patients in the metropolitan Philadelphia area.
- Covenant Preschool and Children's Morning Out were preparing to open in October.
- ASP was finally able to host volunteers by September. Not wanting to ruin Covenant's successive record of sending a team to Appalachia for almost 40 years, Lori and Greg Corner headed down to Unicoi County, Tennessee in October to do what the team usually does make homes warmer, safer, and drier and bring the love of Christ to others.
- In December, Covenant delivered a home cooked dinner to be served at the Life Center in Upper Darby.

2021

Based on the statistics in Delaware County and guidance from the State Department of Health, the CDC and our bishop, Covenant's Health and Safety Task Force agreed that it was not advisable to consider opening for worship at this time.

The Delco Super Bowl of Caring was especially needed as hunger in local communities and around that nation was higher than ever due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Canned and non-perishable food items were dropped off at the entrance to Wesley Hall. Financial donations were made on line or by sending a check to the church. 869 non-perishable food items were collected along with \$3,140 in cash at Covenant. All of these donations went to the Loaves & Fishes Food Pantry in Prospect Park.

Covenant Goals for 2021: Making it R.A.I.N.

He will give rain for the seed with which you sow the ground, and grain, the produce of the ground, which will be rich and plenteous. Isaiah 30:23

Isaiah promises the people that if they sow the seeds, God will cause them to grow. Last fall, Mrs. Krystl Gauld, did some work with our church for one of her graduate school classes. In thinking about what sort of seeds we could be planting here at Covenant, she encouraged us to think about R.A.I.N.: Reach (and touch people in ways that we have never touched them before); Assimilation (Work to change to be more in sync with the way people are living); Inclusion (Offer new people meaningful ways to participate in things); and Nullification (Put an end to things that are harmful: fight injustice).

Joy Karsner Barton then led a group of leaders through two goal-setting sessions, based on Krystl's work, and after those two sessions, PPT has adopted the following goals for 2021, one for each of her themes:

Reach - Record the worship service and deliver it to those who do not have computer or internet access.

Assimilation - Offer our youth at least one social and one service activity in the next 6 months. Work to determine the best way forward for children, youth and families to grow in discipleship.

Inclusion - To make this a year to celebrate the rich diversity of our congregation, by encouraging and embracing the sharing of different traditions and gifts of our members.

Nullification - Have a guest speaker series on social justice issues - both stand-alone events, and sermons.



IN PERSON CHURCH RETURNS

After almost 12 months, on Sunday, May 23, 2021, the church re-opened on a limited basis for one in-person service on Sunday mornings at 9:15 am. Seating was limited to about 70 people and reservations were required. Masks were required for all, temperatures were taken, screening questions asked, and entrance was by three specific doors. At the conclusion of the service, everyone was asked to leave right away and not socialize.

The 9:15 a.m. service was replayed online at 10:45 a.m. where members could use the "chat room" to add comments.



The Wednesday evening book study group was reading Bishop Sally Dyck's "Hopeful Earth" which focused on the Christian response and responsibility to the environment. The new **Covenant Conversations** discussion series in May focused on food waste, composting and zero waste grocery shopping. This presentation was held on-line.

ASP CELEBRATES 40 YEARS OF DEDICATED SERVICE

The ASP team returned to Jonesville, Lee County, Virginia in July where they served in 2009. With this summer's mission trip, members of Covenant have been working with the Appalachian Service Project for 40 years.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

After a summer without Vacation Bible School, Covenant had the opportunity to partner with Shorter AME Church in Morton. Shorter had a large grassy lot which made it possible for the kids to enjoy being together safely. The program ran in the evening on August 2nd through 6th.

WORSHIP UPDATE

After evaluating the latest information from the CDC, Covenant still required masks for worship and for people to be seated in a socially distant manner in church. However, starting on July 25, people were welcomed to sing the hymns (with masks on).



On Friday, August 13, Covenant delivered dinner for 30 residents living at **The Life Center** in Upper Darby. This included making a casserole, salad, buttered bread, brownie and a banana. Bag lunches were also prepared for the next day.

NEW SUNDAY MORNING SCHEDULE

Beginning, September 12th, the Sunday after Labor Day, a new schedule for Sunday worship will be followed:

9:15-10:00 a.m. – Sunday School for all ages 10:15 a.m. – One Worship service, in-person and livestreamed.

VOCAL CHOIRS RESUME

After more than a year of waiting, Covenant's Chancel and Children's choirs resumed rehearsals in the fall with masks on for added safety. The Chancel Choir's first appearance at morning worship occurred on Sunday, September 12th.

3D (Devotion, Design and Dine)

At each gathering, there was a short devotion, a snack or mini-meal and a craft. The first session was held on October 6th from 6-8 p.m. where a wire pumpkin was made. Beth Folkomer was the 3D Coordinator. Future meetings were to be held once a month.

Sharing Our Blessings with the Community



During the initial months of the pandemic, Covenant applied for a loan to pay the salaries of the nursery school staff for the remainder of the school year. The Small Business Administration awarded us a loan much larger than we needed, and after the loan was forgiven, it left the church with a surplus that our Planning and Policy Team (PPT) determined should go out into the community. At their October meeting, PPT voted to distribute the following:

- Shorter AME Church, Morton: A new refrigerator for their feeding ministry \$2-3,000
- Nursery School: Funds for families that cannot afford the full tuition \$1,000
- Eastern PA Conf. of UMC: Hurricane Ida relief funds for local projects \$2,500
- Good Neighbors Home Repair Ministry \$15,000
- Habitat for Humanity of Montco/Delco: For a project in Delco \$15,000.
- Appalachia Service Project (the organization, not our church group) \$5,000
- DIFAN/Family & Community Service of Delaware County \$5,000

This leaves Covenant with a surplus balance of approximately \$7,500 to disburse locally as we determine need.



STAFFING UPDATE

Eddie Williams was hired as Coordinator of Children and Youth Ministries. In this position, Eddie led our youth group, facilitated the work of Sunday school, attended ASP team gatherings, coordinated VBS, developed quarterly family events, worked with the pastor on family programing for Christmas Eve and developed a pool of volunteers. His full-time job was teaching second-grade at a Catholic Academy in Chester.

As more people were trained on worship technology, **Pastor Kevin** turned his attention back to sharing his other gifts: Preaching once a month and leading a small group study or a class of Financial Peace University.



During the first week of November, the Covenant Appalachia Service Project team sent a crew to Jonesville Virginia to serve in ASP's year-round program. The crew of volunteers Greg and Lori Corner, Rich Debany, Todd Gallagher, Tom Hiscott, Victoria Hiscott and Bryce Munce had the pleasure of spending three days with homeowners Lori and Norman who enthusiastically shared stories of life in the mountains on the border between Virginia and Kentucky. During those three days, this small but mighty crew removed a porch and fashioned a hardy new porch, stairs and ramp to make it easier and safer for Lori and Norman to come and go — and almost completed it.

Along the way, they enjoyed lots of challenges, laughs, fun, and faith with prayers and a fried chicken lunch from Lori and Norman.
